## HEAVEN

## **BEYOND IMAGINATION**

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Mankind was created in an infinite universe that contains an unlimited array of cosmological wonders. God created man but He also created a vast infinite universe with a much broader and more significant purpose in mind.

This may be considered a "visionary" view, but it is a well-justified perspective. At some point in the not-so-distant future, at least on a cosmological scale, God's chosen few will be invited to share in the heavenly rewards (whatever they may be) for the balance of eternity. The timeframe itself is difficult to imagine, but an eternity could conceivably be comparable to hundreds of trillions of years. God has an infinite realm of cosmological splendor at His disposal and I believe He created it with a distinct plan for its development.

I certainly wouldn't dismiss anyone else's perception, but I have an extremely difficult time perceiving the rewards of heaven as limited to something as hollow as an

existence in a glorious "place" with an array of insignificant monetary values. I have a hard time believing that God who created the entire universe would place much, if any, significance on monetary things like living on a plush planet in luxurious mansions in a some magical city with streets of gold lined with magnificent jasper. There may very well be such a place, perhaps some sort of base of operations (???), but it is simply too easy to imagine such a place. A "reward" such as that would seem to be contradictory to what the Bible teaches and are insignificantly miniscule, particularly on a cosmic scale. Perhaps we should be envisioning eternal "rewards" that are considerably more enticing and genuinely more exciting for the non-believers as well.

The bible encourages us to use our imagination and, since I believe mine is rather vivid, I'd like to convey a personal vision of an eternal god-like celestial existence, one that is truly beyond the realm of anyone's imagination.

"Have I not said that you are gods also?" Jesus made that statement for a reason. Perhaps what Christ was saying to us is worthy of more consideration. If eternal life provides us with an existence as "gods" of some sort, I just don't see our Heavenly Father wasting our god-like

capabilities on an eternity spent lounging around in luxurious mansions. I would be extremely surprised to learn that our heavenly responsibilities were somehow limited to indulging in perpetual praise and song. I believe He has a much bigger and considerably more significant plan in store for us.

God chartered the course of our spiritual destiny long before He created the universe and mankind. What that eternal fate might consist remains a mystery, but as depicted in Corinthians 2:9-10, heaven is beyond our imagination. "No one's ever seen or heard anything like this, never so much as imagined anything quite like it, what God has arranged for those who love Him. But God has revealed it to us by his Spirit"

Heaven might very-well be a "place" somewhere in the universe or beyond, perhaps where God reigns from. It may be like the description in Revelation 21, but that "place" would probably be God's 'Headquarters', the nucleus of operations for development of His vast cosmological kingdom. This "place" might be where His chosen few gather and in His glorious presence, but since ours is a rapidly expanding universe, I seriously doubt that His plan for the rest of that universe is to discard it. I just don't think
